Other activities will develop fine motor skills. The art schemes children follow in EYFS will relate to topics being undertaken in class, and the topics with which the children are engaged, and therefore will subsequently alter. Children will enjoy spray painting, drawing with felts, crayons, oil pastels, and chalks, progressing to exploring observational drawing in the Summer Term. Similarly they will begin explore printing through using found objects, developing into mono printing techniques. Their three dimensional work may be as individuals, in groups, or may be working with staff to enhance their learning environments e.g. the igloo. Marjorie Schick at San Francisco			

For example in the Autumn Term they explore paint in sensory and playful ways eg. using a plastic paddling pool with a ball inside rolled by groups of children to create paintings, activities which encourage socialization, and gross motor skills.




Zooming in to Artwork



Using this excellent online tool pupils will be able to explore famous paintings and examine them in close detail, including the cracks in the paintwork of "Starry Night" by Van Gogh, and "No Woman No Cry" by Chris Ofili, which has a detailed portrait hidden inside the painting. Children will have the opportunity to develop their painting and drawing skills inspired by the work examined.

Jewellery Design

Pupils will look at jewellery worn by people from different parts of the world and from different cultures. They will consider the importance of jewellery to different rituals and ceremonies.



Mixed Media & Printing

Pupils will create a layered tissue paper, and recycled paper collage with geometric shapes, then use



mixed media to render observational nature drawings on top. In addition they will draw dinosaur fossilised bones, using fineliner pens, a variety of drawing pencils, experimenting also with carbon paper prints, and mono printing, extending their understanding of printing and the combining of materials.



Autumn 2

Still Life

Exploring more traditional drawing skills. Developing observational drawing skills, the ability to look and record using view finders. An exploration of a variety of drawing materials, including chalk and charcoal, drawing pens, hard and soft pencils, graphite pencils, fineliner pens, oil pastels and watercolours. Children also using carbon paper to add a printed dimension to their work.

Spring 2



"I'm in the Artwork!"
Children will explore three paintings/artworks from different eras and artists, to understand the artist's intentions and ideas.
Children will consider
Banksy's homage to another artist 'Boy And Dog In A Johnnypump,' Bruce

Mclean's "Pose Work for

Plinths 3," and Niki de Saint Phalle's "Sun God."



Children in pairs will decide which artwork to put themselves into, make props, or a costume to change the artwork, and be photographed in it, using the green screen.

Public Art

What Are the 5 Most Famous Examples of Contemporary Public Art?

Pupils will explore what public art is, and what impact seeing these imaginative works might have on them coming across them unexpectedly in a familiar location. Pupils will create cardboard cityscape backgrounds, and use packing pellets, cardboard and coloured wire to create their sculptural designs, their own public art designs.

First Year of Scheme – Autumn 2, 27th November 23

Surrealism

Pupils will grasp Surrealism as an art movement, which evolved because of the concurrent developments in the world. Pupils will particularly study Rene Magritte, Meret Oppenheim, and Leonara Carrington.

Pupils will also recognize the impact Surrealism has had on today, looking particularly at advertising.

Pupils will manipulate images digitally to create Surrealist inspired artworks.



Curriculum Links-ICT

First Year of Scheme – Spring 1, 5th February 24

<u>Water - Monet's Water Lilies and a Right to Clean</u> <u>Water</u>

Pupils will look at the contrasting work of Claude Monet and his prolonged dedication to observing and painting water, and contrast this with the contemporary statement and photograph of visual artist Serge Attukwei Clottey, a commissioned photograph by Water Aid, a piece to highlight the struggle to obtain clean water.

Pupils will explore Monet's water lilies through learning water colour techniques, and in groups



consider what imagery they might use to highlight the plight of those struggling for a clean water source.



Pupils after being introduced to each "Perspectives" will	
make a creative response accessing different drawing,	
painting, printing and collage resources.	



First Year – Spring 2, 25th March

Architecture and Inspiration

This Art Day investigates the relationship between architecture, creativity and



imagination. Pupils will explore Fallingwater a World Heritage House designed in 1935 by renowned American architect Frank

Lloyd Wright. Investigating Lloyd Wright's inspirations pupils will listen to Beethoven. In contrast pupils will look at the connection between architecture, environment and creativity when exploring "Shangri La Studio," and the influence this building has on the music industry. Thirdly pupils will look at the local Alder Hey Hospital and its uncompromising, fun, design, a building focussed on the patient, and again the external views to the environment, for patient wellbeing.

In response pupils will work creatively in groups to design and make their own model of a building, thinking about environment, purpose, and the users.

Collaborative art work

First Year – Summer 1, 20thth May 24

Art and Identity

In this Art Day children will look at different artists whose work deliberates identity including Cindy Sherman, who takes on different personas, Grayson Perry who looks at what it is to be English and a man, and Kyle Meyer who seeks to explore his own identity as a gay man within the LGBTQ communities.




Pupils will chose which media and/or media to combine from **collage**, print making, oil pastels, paints, or cardboard relief.

First Year – Summer 2, 10thth June 24


Mythical Greek Creatures
